Topics that will be discussed include concept mapping, multimodality, peer instruction and group work, use of classroom response systems (e.g., clickers), and frequent informal assessment of student thinking. Presenters will share principles behind each practice, and demonstrate ways to enact this practice in large and small classes. Participants will have the opportunity to develop ways to implement these practices in their own classes.

In this workshop, we will explore ways in which faculty and the university can more effectively partner with communities, both local and international. We will draw on examples from work within the Chicago Public Schools, from community collaborations in response to increased violence in our Chicago neighborhoods, and from lessons learned from global NGO's. Participants will have an opportunity to consider ways in which Thomas Ehrlich's definition of civic engagement as "working to make a difference in the civic life of our communities and developing the combination of knowledge, skills, values and motivation to make that difference" can be operationalized in teaching, and augmented by considering sociologist Arthur Frank's call for a "renewal of generosity," expanding our sense of hospitality by blurring the borders between classroom and community.

First, participants will learn how to write objectives and design test blueprints. We will then work on guidelines to follow when assembling a test, as well as guidelines for administering and scoring tests. *(This part is the same as the first part of the workshop entitled "Constructing, Administering, and Scoring Tests: Selected-Response Items" so if you attended that one, you could skip this by arriving about 45-50 minutes after the start time.)* Second, we will focus on how to devise various types of constructed-response items (i.e., short answer, completion, and essay questions). Participants will also learn how to create scoring guides and rubrics to evaluate students' responses to these items.

First, participants will learn how to write objectives and design test blueprints. We will discuss advantages and disadvantages of each item type and guidelines to follow when writing items of each type. Participants will practice identifying and correcting flaws in items.

This workshop will focus on teaching all UIC students, honoring their strengths and recognizing challenges, as we plan, implement, and assess teaching in our courses. Universal Design for Learning (UDL) is a powerful framework developed to manage and alter access and obstacles in architectural structures. This framework has been adapted in developing highly effective educational practices for students with diverse learning challenges. Universal Design for Learning enables teachers to build on student assets and provide access to learning in a variety of ways. Participants will see instructional artifact examples and use workshop time to develop reforms to implement UDL in their own courses.

Design thinking process will be demonstrated as a catalyst for improvement of teaching with technology.
